Letter of Support

Please provide a letter of support for your application. This letter is to be from someone in your community (family member, teacher, boss, etc.) that can provide a character reference for you. Please ask your reference to include their contact information, just in case we have any further questions for them. Also, have your references email the letters to you in PDF format and then upload them to your application.

Letters should address your preparedness for the Ceiba program - your emotional, creative, and intellectual investment into different tasks that come your way. You will be living in a shared- housing situation, working in communities far different than those you've grown up in, and representing yourself, your service organization, and Ceiba in a dynamic creative way. Letters should talk about you as a whole person and how you would contribute to the Ceiba experience.

Interviews

As a final step to your application, you will have a phone or Skype interview with our Spanish teacher. This is to gauge your confidence with your spoken Spanish - it is not a vocabulary test but rather how comfortable you are when speaking, even if you don't have all the words. You will be interacting almost daily with local Guatemalans who don't speak any English at all so your comfort level is important. Again, it is not that you know all the words, it's that you do your best - your fluency will increase a thousand times over while you're in Guatemala!

There will also be a call from either Scott Garrison, Director of Education, or Kamillia Hoban, Director of Operations, so that we can answer any last questions or address any other concerns you have as we review all the applications.
